

editor It was more than six months ago when Bill Arbuckle, a Lewisburg, Tenn., man, probably not known to anyone in Loudon County, first came to Loudon and began trÿing to obtain options on 3500 acres of land in Matlock Bend. These past six months have been much like a love story. It got off to a rocky start, almost finished that way, but apparently ended in marriage.

He has a friend at the Third National Bank in Nashville who passes on some work to him whenever the occasion arises. From what we have learned from Bill he was called one Thursday in July by Tom Greene of Third National and was asked if he could look at some land at Loudon that was a possible site for a major industrial expansion by a firm that did not want even Arbuckle to know the identity of. Bill said yes, and that he would come to Loudon the following week. He was told no, not next week, now.

For several weeks Bill stumbled from door to door, accompanied most of the time by J. Y. The options began to pile up. . then a couple of the key property owner McNabb talked him into staying and getting some of the local industrial, business and government leaders involved to try and salvage the project. To what extent will Loudon County residents be enriching the Federal coffers, come April 15th, through their income tax payments? The government counts on their contributions being larger than they were last year, when local returns of personal income and employment taxes were close to \$12,243,000. That is the approximate amount that was turned in locally, based upon an unofficial breakdown of the statewide collection figures released by the Internal Revenue Service. From the State of Tennessee as a whole, Uncle Sam received over \$2,260,00,000 last year, the

From the state of Tennessee as a whole, Uncle Sam received over \$2,26,00,000 last year, the IRS figures show. Of this total, taxpayers in Loudon County paid an estimated 0.55 percent. The returns, @enerally, are expected to be bigger this year because of the wage gains chalked up by most families in 1973 and because more people were employed nationally than in 1972. 1972

1972. As a result, the budget submitted by the Administration looks for personal income and employment faxes to yield a record \$202 billion. That is \$24. billion more than in 1973, when the tax hau! was \$177.2 billion. Local taxpayers will be shouldering their full share of this increase. It is expected, reflecting the higher level of income in the area in the past war.

On that basis, the Loudon County collections

On that basis, the Loudon County collections next month will come to approximately \$13,957.000, it is calculated. The Administration's new budget, for the fiscal year that begins in July, 1974, calls for bigger income tax receipts next year than ever before, although the rates will remain the same. The budget anticipates \$220 billion next year in personal income and employment taxes, an increase of \$18 billion were the current level

It bothered me a little and it must have bothered you back in November and December, at a time when folks were just beginning to understand the reai effects of the energy crisis, that articles in newspapers and periodicals throughout our nation had our entertainments and sport amusements doomed for a gloomy 1974. Boat sales were supposed to have dropped in every state. A New Jersey dealer reportedly had to cancel almost \$100,000 in orders for new power boats. A manufacture in Missouri which produced about 20 pleasure crists a day laid off 140 employees due to a shortage of resins derived from a petrochemical base and used in production of fiberglass boats. The firm normally employed 360 persons. And so it was

asserted that without sufficient fuel to run the power crafts that the energy crisis would not only discourage purchase of new boats, but would force thousands of the 9,210,000 registered boat owners in the United States of which 6,500,000 use gasoline or diesel oil in quantity for propulsion, to keep their craft on shore bundled in their winter cocoons this

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

Twenty year Progress Report of Loudon County Schools from 1954 - 1974.

Consolidation: Twenty (20) two and three room schools have been consolidated with larger schools during this period.

Permit Teachers: In 1954 we had (37) permit teachers in the Loudon County Schools. Today we have no permit teachers.

Teacher Pupil Ratio: We have only 24 pupils over teacher pupil ratio. Thirty (30) pupils for one teacher in grades 1-6.

Teachers Salaries: In 1964 beginning teacher with B.S. or B.A. degree salary was \$2200.00, 15 years experience \$2,500.00, 1974 B.S. or B.A. beginning teacher salary is \$6,000.00, 15 years experience \$4,560.00.
 Transportation: State Department of Education report states that Loudon County has one of the best fleet of achool buses in the State and the best insurance coverage. \$100,000 per person, \$500,000 each accident \$25,000 property damage, \$1,000 per person medical (uninsured motorist \$10,000 per person and \$20,000 per accident.) \$3,000 pupils transported daily.

7. Philadelphia: Addition to gym, renovation on part of old building, 3 acres of additional land.



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

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USE HANGING BASKETS FOR INDOOR LANDSCAPING By: Bonnie F. Sheeley Assistant Extension Agent

Try hanging baskets in your indoor landscaping this winter. A hanging basket is any container which holds living plants and can be suspended from a support. The basket may actually be a wooden box, a moss lined wire basket, plastic pot or any other container. Provisions must be made for hanging baskets that are used

Also the basket needs strong upports to hold the moist soil and the plants. The basket should hang near a window or in the light. As for the nation as a whole, the figures show a decrease of 12.119 square milles of land. The latest total, reported by the Census Bureau, is 3,436,855 square miles. This compares with 3,548,974 in 1960. To a large extent, what the country lost in land area it gained in water area, which increased by 12,030 square miles. Overall, the United States seems to have suffered a net loss of 89 square miles.

Loudon County is currently listed by the Census Bureau as having a land area of 237 square miles, which is somewhat less than its

1960 total of 240.

Ived total of 240. The new figure given for the State of Tennessee is 41,328 square miles of land, as against the 41,762 reported previously. What is the explanation for the changes? To some degree they are the result of land erosion caused by inland waters encroaching on their banks.

In other cases, they are due to inaccuracies found in the maps used in the computing of areas. Sometimes, streams that border counties have been exaggerated in width, throwing off the calculations. Occasionally, the part that is under water has been counted in with the land mass. To a greater dearee, however the stream

To a greater degree, however, the changes are attributed to a correction of errors discovered in the former calculating method and to new equipment, now in use, capable of making computations electronically down to a fraction of a square inch. With the adjustments in population and in area since 1960, there have been revisions in the density figures. The density in Loudon County is now given as 102 persons per square mile.
